Accessibility touches on many parts of the fandom experience, and affects everyone, including fans with disabilities.


If you're new to it and just starting now, making things more accessible won't be perfect. Every little bit helps make the fandom space more accessible and inclusive for everyone.



Why accessibility?


- There are lots of different ways to participate in fandom spaces

Models of disability

There are 3 main models of disability. Each model addresses the perceived causes of disability, appropriate responses, and deeper meanings.

- Moral model
- Medical model
- Social model



<u>Conceptualizing disability: Three models of disability</u>

What is accessibility?

Accessibility addresses discriminatory aspects related to equivalent user experience for people with disabilities.

Fandom activities

- Zines
- Bangs & exchanges
- Streaming
- Art, writing
- Sharing what you've been up to on social media
- Recommending to everyone your favorite new boys' love comic
- Websites & shops
- Going to the con, etc.



Examples of accessibility

- Your friends are having a shouting match about their favorite pairing headcanons
- Shopping for merch, but you have a migraine
- Going to the convention with your cosplay, and you're pulling your luggage over the curb
- Playing a new game, and you change the size of the text



Examples

- New audio or drama CD that comes with lyrics
- Sharing what you've been up to on social media
- Catching up on some manga or anime before you get spoiled, but you have to be quiet







But what does all this have to do with fandom?

- Things that I've noticed people have been doing, but aren't aware that it's inaccessible
- Preparing for the future you, or working towards including more current fans
- Something that might come across as a minor annoyance might be a major blocker to someone else (Example: <u>Your</u> <u>Interactive Makes Me Sick</u>)

Emojis



Color contrast

- Picking themes with enough size difference and colour contrast
 - o <u>Contrast Checker</u>
- Avoid busy backgrounds that interfere with text
- Dark mode is an accessibility feature, but sometimes the contrast is reduced so it's hard to read



What is alternative text (alt text)?

Alternative text is a textual substitute for non-text content in web pages. **Context matters.**

This is text for screen reader users and search engines.

- Alt text as poetry
- How to add descriptive text to images in AO3
- alt="" to make your image decorative



Alt text

Alternative text should:

- Be informative and concise
- Most important information at the front
- Images of text should contain the alt text


One possible example: "Char and Amuro of the Mobile Suit Gundam anime are fighting in a field. Amuro is on top of Char with an angry expression. They are pulling at each other's suits in a homoerotic way."




Not all screen reader users are blind

- Read aloud apps
- Focus or reading issues

- Discord captions, when
- Accessibility as default
 - Idolish7 barrier-free screenings
 - Captioned dubs
- More online or hybrid cons(!)
- More tools where you don't have to sacrifice privacy for community, and is built with accessibility first
